Llano River Watershed Alliance

### Llano River Field Station in Featured Video



The Texas Tech Llano River Field Station's efforts to research and implement techniques for the land to use less water is featured in <u>this 10-minute video</u>. These techniques include riparian habitat restoration, feral hog control and brush control. Many of these techniques are featured in the <u>Upper Llano River Watershed Protection Plan</u>, available for public comment until July 8<sup>th</sup>.

In case folks are wondering about the use of a mechanized vehicle in the streambed, the Llano River Field Station is located on both banks of the South Llano River. An exemption in Chapter 90 of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Code permits access to property on the opposite side of river via the streambed if no reasonable alternate access is available and the most direct feasible route is utilized.
