




Latest Paddling Trail Sign

South Llano Flows



The latest measurements by the <u>Real-Edwards Conservation & Reclamation District</u> show the flows in the upper portion of the South Llano River increasing slightly from last month. According to Joel Pigg, General Manager of the District, flows at the Telegraph (Upper) Crossing were 64 cfs on August 15, up about 1 cfs from July. The Lower Crossing near the old Evergreen School also increased about 1 cfs from the previous month to 68 cfs.
