



Upper Llano River Watershed Protection Plan



Upper Llano River Watershed Protection Plan Available for Public Comment

Readers of this newsletter are invited to provide comments on the draft Upper Llano River Watershed Protection Plan during the 30-day formal public comment period, June 8 through July 8.


The plan, developed by the Upper Llano Watershed Coordination Committee, is available for <u>Download on our website</u>. The Alliance participated as a stakeholder in the Coordination Committee and is providing its website for hosting documents and information related to the Plan.

Texas Tech University Llano River Field Station and Texas Water Resources Institute worked with the Upper Llano River Watershed Coordination Committee to develop and implement the plan.

The Plan contains strategies to address emerging watershed issues related to feral hogs, loss of riparian habitat, spread of Ashe juniper, and urban storm water runoff, to name a few of the topics. The Coordination Committee developed these strategies based on nearly three years of water quality and aquatic sampling, as well as watershed modeling. A four-page Executive Summary of the Plan highlights the issues in the watershed and the strategies to address them.

USGS unveils new Texas Water Dashboard



The US Geological Survey recently released their <u>Texas Water Dashboard</u>, a website devoted to providing data on floods and rainfall, rainfall predictions, and even camera feeds from their gaging stations. This website was developed in partial response to the deadly Memorial Day floods of 2015.

Users of the database can access a map to view the latest stream flow conditions for a selected gage, as well as the rate of change in flow and stage. All of these data can be examined against a backdrop of current radar conditions and projected rainfall totals over the next seven days.

The website also provides up-to-the-minute Twitter feeds for USGS flood predictions, rainfall totals, and developing storms. On the other end of the spectrum, the website provides drought and up-to-the-minute wildfire info.
