


Preventing Waterborne Illnesses

The Brazos River Authority has prepared an informative information sheet on waterborne diseases and how to prevent them. While the waters of the Llano are likely cleaner than the Brazos, it never hurts to consider these timely precautions.

Devil is in the details—or is the drought really over?

This week the Texas Water Development Board posted to their Facebook page: Even though the U.S. Drought Monitor has declared no drought in Texas, the monitor favors weather and soil conditions. It doesn't necessarily reflect water supplies such as reservoirs and aquifers. Many reservoirs are still low including Abilene (3.4%), Spence (8.2%), Twin Buttes (8.5%)...
