

RACA River Float June 30th



Llano River Watershed Alliance, in conjunction with Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD), will host the *RACA River Float* on the South Llano River on *June 30th from 9am to 1pm*.

TPWD's River Access and Conservation Area (RACA) program aims to increase sustainable fishing and paddling access to rivers and streams across private lands. This partnership between local landowners, TPWD and cooperating organizations will allow Texans to more fully enjoy the natural beauty that our local rivers have to offer and riverside landowners an opportunity to earn extra monthly income.

Recovery Mix.




The treatment involves making a hatchet slash in the bark of the tree into which the approved herbicide is applied. The Alliance helped support the effort by providing the herbicide.

RACA River Float...continued

The RACA River Float on the 30th will highlight the existing RACA site on the South Llano at County Road 150, locally known as Boone's Crossing. This site was designated to relieve local landowner concerns about boater parking at the Crossing.

Participants will meet at 9am at Boone's Crossing. FREE shuttles will be provided upstream to the First Crossing (from Junction) of the South Llano at US 377. Boaters will paddle the 2.7 miles downstream to Boone's Crossing, taking time to enjoy the beautiful scenery, swim, fish, and pick up trash (litterbags provided). A prize



will be awarded to the boat that picks up the most trash.

For folks who do not wish to paddle, there will be volunteer opportunities Boone's Crossing (CR 150 Access) to improve landscaping and signage at the RACA site.

Around Noon, we will gather at the nearby riverside property of Nol Dear to enjoy **FREE BBQ from Lum's** and to learn more about landowner and recreational opportunities available through the RACA program. Staff from TPWD will be on hand to talk about the program and answer questions. Nol, who is the lessor to the Boone's Crossing RACA site, will share her firsthand experiences with the program. *RSVP if you want BBQ*



Local Students Learn about Rivers and Erosion at Science in the Sun

Area students (grades 2-5) attending Junction Outdoor School's *Science in the Sun* at the Llano River Field Station this week were able to get quite a bit of hands-on learning this week.

A popular science station stop was the Field Station's Stream Trailer where a portable stream helps student learn about stream meanders, bank erosion, and the importance of large woody debris for protecting stream banks.





The Shoot Out at Green Lake

Buck Lake Birds, Butterflies, Bugs & More - Saturday, June 16th 9:00 am - 10:00 am

Meet at Acorn Blind (Down the path from the restrooms, between campsites 39 and 41) On this easy morning stroll, we'll walk past beautiful Buck Lake, named for the family who donated the land for the state park. We'll look for birds, butterflies, turtles, frogs, insects, lizards and more! There is one steep but short hill, and the rest of the dirt path is fairly level. Good walking shoes and drinking water are recommended, and dress for the weather! All ages welcome.



Skins, Skulls, and More! - Saturday, June 16th drop in between 1:30 - 2:30 pm

Held at Acorn Blind (Down the path from the restrooms, between campsites 39 and 41) Stop by between 1:30 and 2:30 to see and touch animal furs and skulls, and find out what a skull can tell us about how that animal survives! Children must be accompanied by an adult.

Japanese Fish Printing - Sunday, June 17th 10:00 am - 11:00 am



Meet at Acorn Blind (down the path from the restrooms, between campsites 39 and 41) Try your hand at the ancient art of Gyotaku, a method that Japanese fishermen used to record their catch! All materials are provided. All ages welcome! Children must be accompanied by an adult.



River Bugs! - Saturday, June 23rd 10:00 am - 11:00 am

Meet at the 2nd Day Use parking lot (take the road across from Headquarters, follow to the end, look for water bug pole)

Come find out what kinds of insects live in the river! We will show you how to use a dip net and a magnifying glass to discover cool aquatic insects! Sun protection and drinking water are recommended. Wear clothes you can get wet! Children must be accompanied by an adult.

Skins, Skulls, and More! - Saturday, June 23rd drop in between 1:30 - 2:30 pm

Held at Acorn Blind (Down the path from the restrooms, between campsites 39 and 41) Stop by to see and touch animal furs and skulls, and find out what a skull can tell us about how that animal survives! Children must be accompanied by an adult.



Backyard Bass - Sunday, June 24th 10:00 am - 11:00 am

No bait needed since we will not catch real fish. Don't know how to fish? This fun game will help you learn the basics! Sun protection and drinking water are recommended.
