

Guadalupe Bass
Fingerlings find new
home in Llano



Last Tuesday, the good folks from the A.E. Wood State Fish Hatchery in San Marcos released 37,000 Guadalupe Bass fingerlings into the Llano River below the dam in Junction. This release is part of the Guadalupe Bass Restoration Initiative to return pure strains of Guadalupe Bass to the Llano. This initiative is a partnership between Texas Parks and Wildlife and the Llano River Watershed Alliance.



#### Find a well near you with TWDB new database tool



Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) has updated their groundwater database to a user friendly Water Data Interactive website. Simply select the area of interest, select your Base Layer (county or groundwater conservation district, for example) then click Groundwater and select the data you wish to display. Selecting TWDB Groundwater will display all of the wells that the agency has some type of data, be it water level, well depth, etc. Selecting Submitted Driller Reports will display all new wells drilled or refurbished since about 2002. Clicking on the well location will display the available information as well as a well number you can use to further access information. NOTE: You may have to zoom in to individually select wells.
