

# South Llano gets first rise of the year



Nearly 3 inches of rain above Telegraph sent a pulse flow down the South Llano River this morning. The South Llano River gage near Flatrock peaked at over 2,000 cfs a little after midnight Friday morning. This is the largest flow on the South Llano since September 26<sup>th</sup> of last year, when the gage peaked at 12,500 cfs.

## Volunteer opportunity: controlling invasive Chinaberry along the South Llano

On Monday, June 12th, join Hill Country Alliance, Texas Parks & Wildlife, Texas Tech, Native American Seed, and the Llano River Watershed Alliance at the Llano River Field Station in Junction, TX, to learn about riparian (river-side) ecosystems, non-native invasive plants, and how to steward riparian systems.

Volunteers will help restore riparian habitat along the Llano River by controlling non-native, invasive



Chinaberry trees with hand-tools (e.g. hand saws, loppers). Chinaberry have encroached on this reach of river, displacing native plant species that insects, fish, and wildlife depend on for habitat needs.

Drinks, snacks, and hand-tools will be provided.

Please bring work gloves, a refillable bottle of water, appropriate fieldwork clothing (e.g. long pants and shirt, closed-toe shoes, a hat) and sunscreen.
