Hill Country and Llano Watershed Selected for Partnership Program



Last fall, the Llano River Field Station and Llano River Watershed Alliance, in conjunction with 17 other partners, applied to the Natural Resources Conservation Service's (NRCS) *Regional Conservation Partnership Program* to address natural resource concerns related to extreme drought and flooding in the Texas Hill Country.

NRCS recently announced that the project, the Hill Country Headwaters Conservation Initiative, has been selected as one of three projects in Texas. More than \$5 million of additional funding will be available in the coming years to landowners to implement NRCS conservation programs, including funding for brush control. Stay tuned.



Precipitation and Groundwater Levels in Sutton County


From our friends at the Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District...

In the Sutton UWCD Newsletter, *Karst Chronicle*, the District provides a year in review look at rainfall and groundwater levels in the County. (They divide the County into three regions, with the eastern portion of the County in the North Llano Watershed.) For the year, Sutton County received 23.46 inches, a slight decrease from 2016, with 24.79 inches. But like most of the entire Llano Watershed, the last quarter showed less than 2 inches.



Water levels in the District's Drought Index Well also dropped slightly during the last quarter, but only by 0.3 feet. The District does not consider this drop significant, but the one-foot drop for the year may initiate some level of concern. While we do not have corresponding data for the North Llano, we do know that springflow in the South Llano can be impacted by just a two foot drop in water levels.

Groundwater Levels and Springflow on South Llano River




Figure 10. Groundwater levels measured at the Lazy H Ranch in Edwards County and Seven Hundred springs and Tanner Springs in Edwards County from 2009-2014.

The drought also impacted groundwater levels and spring flows. Figure 10 shows declining water levels in a monitoring well northeast of Rocksprings and decreasing spring flow in the headwaters of the South Llano. While water levels only declined about two feet, Tanner Springs fell below 5 cfs and registered its lowest recorded flow of 2 cfs in January of 2015. Spring flow at Seven Hundred Springs declined to about 12 cfs and then maintained a fairly continual flow; these springs reacted in the same manner during the drought of the 1950s.

Something New in the Watershed

JUNCTION – South Llano River State Park is excited to announce its First Annual Birding Festival, sponsored by the Friends of South Llano River State Park, to be held Friday, April 27 through Sunday, April 29th, 2018.

The Festival will feature guided bird walks, including Golden-cheeked Warbler walks and Birding the Riparian, and will also offer guided photography sessions in the park's four popular bird blinds. On Saturday afternoon, the festival will offer a live birds of prey presentation by Last Chance Forever, a Bird Call presentation by a young birder, a Beginners' Bird Walk, and vendor and information tables. Sunday morning will include more bird walks, and a Big Sit! as part of the Great Texas Birding Classic.

More than 250 species of birds have been observed at the park, including sought-after



species such as the Golden-cheeked Warbler and Black-capped Vireo, both federally endangered birds which nest in the park. "We are so excited to showcase the terrific birding at our park and its beautiful bird blinds during one of the busiest bird migration weekends of the year," says Park Interpreter Holly Platz. "The park is very unique for birding, because it offers such varied habitat."

During the Festival, guided walks will offer participants a chance at spotting new bird species for their lists, and ample "free time" between walks and presentations will provide visitors with a chance to enjoy the park's popular bird blinds, each meticulously cared for by park volunteers and staff. "We hope that bringing a festival like this to the park and the city of Junction will highlight the area's biodiversity," says Park Superintendent Scott Whitener. "Birding along the South Llano River is top notch and attracts visitors from all over the world."
